



Harrisburg City Council Minutes November 8, 2017

The Harrisburg City Council met on this date at City Hall, located at 120 Smith St. at the hour of 6:43pm. Presiding was Mayor Robert Duncan. Also present were as follows:

Concerned Citizens in the Audience:

Crosswalk at Smith & 3rd St.:

Bobby Demaris, of 225 LaSalle St., was present this evening to express his concerns in regards to the crosswalk on 3rd St. His fiancée lives downtown, and works at Subway, and she has been late to work because nobody will stop. He has a companion animal, and is often held up at the corner waiting for the traffic to stop for quite a long time. He was frustrated, because he's concerned that someone will get hurt or killed at this area. He was upset that one of the deputies had been behind Harrisburg Insurance, and pulled someone over for not having brake lights, but wouldn't pull people over when they weren't stopping for pedestrians.

- Latta explained that the HRA will be paying for improvements on Smith St., and we hope to install the rapid flashing beacon lights that pedestrians can use to more safely cross the street. He added that it's a tough spot for drivers to see, because of the historical zone allowing zero lot lines, plus the locations of the light poles. We hope to work on that either this summer, or the next.
- Demaris said that his fiancée has been late for work. He told Council that they should go out there with a stopwatch, and see how long it takes for someone to cross.
- Mayor Duncan was looking forward to the crosswalk getting better visibility. He has trouble crossing there too, as does his wife. He's yelled at people, and still, people don't even notice.
- Sergeant Greg Klein was present, and said that he can do a focus patrol there. Latta had already talked with him about the situation that Demaris was complaining about.
- Mayor Duncan said that the crosswalk is complicated by it being a state highway. We are working on getting more visibility there, but it takes a while sometimes.

Future Marathon ending in Harrisburg:

- David Cragun, Director of the Pacific Northwest Marathon, is looking at changing their proposed marathon course, to end in Harrisburg. They are adding a marathon in the fall. Unfortunately, additional resources, such as the police, aren't available in the fall due to the football games. We are excited to look at finishing here in Harrisburg, and think we have a very good course option mapped out. They have about 700 people who run in the weekend events. Coburg wanted the marathon to end there, but unfortunately, that's an uphill course. Therefore, it would start near Coburg. The proposed date is September 15th. Obviously, they need approval from the County Commissioners, and the City Council. However, they've also talked to the school, and the athletic department; they are excited about sponsorships for the race. He had sent an email to Brian with the course in Harrisburg. (Latta showed on the screen the routes that had been sent to him. Please see Addendum No. 1 for a copy of the routes shown to Council.) They would need to post flaggers at some of the busier roads, such as Diamond Hill. They don't want to close the roads down, but they do want people to drive slowly. He is excited to present this to Council, and wants to know what's important to them about this process? He's in the planning process currently.
- Latta added that one of the considerations they made is to not cross the railroad tracks. The roads that they have proposed are good ones, that circulate through residential parts of town, ending at the high school.
- Cragun said that approximately 700 runners/walkers will get to see the other parts of Harrisburg.
- Latta noted that there are a lot of benefits to having another event in our community. They will need to fill out a public event permit, and a traffic control plan. He thinks it's a good thing for the community. They are doing high level planning at this point, but he looks forward to getting an application when they are ready, which he recommends should be approved by City Council.
- Cragun added that he'd prefer that they finish along the river, but they don't want to risk crossing the railroad tracks, which would stop racers. Their race is a qualifier for the Boston Marathon, and they get hundreds of runners. He understood that there might be plans to build a park south of the City, and maybe there could be a footpath under the tracks. The sooner you can do something like that, the better, because it would be ideal for them. If there is anything he can do to help with that process, he would like to offer it.
- Latta said that right now, there is an easement across Knife River's property, but we would need to complete the easement path from the fast tracks to 6th St. If you can get from there to the tracks, you would be able to go under the tracks to get to the park. We do have some money dedicated from Knife River; and Council could prioritize that as a first project for the development of the 100 acre park. It could perhaps kickstart some other funding efforts we have.
- Downey said that she would be a fan of that. She doesn't want to worry about kids, etc., going across the tracks. Having a path would be a benefit to our citizens.
- Puls was really excited about the potential for this.
- Linn County Commissioner Roger Nyquist, was present this evening as well. He sat in on the briefing meeting with David and Brian; and he's here to support David's endeavor. They have a good business plan in the course, and who knows what this event could turn into. He will watch for this, and will make sure that the permitting process works for the county. He could talk with the Parks Director for Linn County, and maybe he can find a grant or something that would help with the path. He also wished the City Council luck in their election results, as he knows that there are still outstanding ballots to be counted.

- Council thanked them both for being there, and for bringing this opportunity to Harrisburg.

Stanley St. Revisted:

- Mayor Duncan said that he would void the two-minute limitation on this subject.
- Latta had sent a letter to Council, which was a two page letter. (The letter is on file in the City Recorder's file). It was a letter requesting that Council reconsider the decision that they made on Stanley St. As Council remembers, you chose option no. 1, which was relocating the paved section of the road to be within the actual 15' right-of-way. The procedures for a reconsideration, is that you must do it by the next Council meeting, which this is. The second issue is that only the people on the majority vote can vote to re-visit the topic. He leaves this up to Council to decide.
- Mayor Duncan asked the Council what their thoughts were.
- Puls said that it's inappropriate to reconsider this. We already came to a decision, and we already took testimony. We already decided that it wasn't good to take the homeowner's property, and to keep the road where it is currently.
- Latta added that Boese is the only one who can't make a decision to reconsider; and he's not here this evening.
- Puls wouldn't be interested in revisting this unless the owners are willing to sell their property.
- Lacey LaDuke, 485 N. 7th St., and the owner of the property in question, said that her preference is to not sell. She prefers that the road is relocated to within the original boundaries it was supposed to be in. They've had vandalism, trespassing, and lots of problems since we started the fence after the survey went through. Our preference is what you voted on. If we look to sell in the future, they would love to discuss selling that portion to the City. But with where things are now, they would like to keep the 700 sq. ft. that they've been paying taxes on.
- Caughey said that he wasn't in favor either, if there is not really an answer. The decision was made, we had no opinions from the public that night, and he doesn't think it's worthwhile to revisit it. The best thing is to get the street back to where it should have been from the start. One of the issues that was brought up previously though, was fire trucks not being able to get into the reduced size of street. He contacted the Fire Chief, Bart Griffith, and asked him to look at the road there. The Fire Chief took pictures of that intersection with a truck in there, and felt that while it's limited space, that it could work. (Please see Addendum No. 2 for copies of the pictures and email from Chief Griffith).
- Chief Griffith was present this evening, and said that they had no issues approaching the intersection from the west side of Stanley. From the east side of the intersection, they have the wheels hitting the curb. They do run the risk of breaking the cement there, regardless of what everyone decides. It is very narrow there. He thought it was about 171 inches from one fence to the other; their truck is around 150 inches or so. He doesn't see that there is a problem getting through to the other properties from N. 7th St. He did want to let them know, that there is a soft spot where the cement is sinking down; he'll take Chuck out and show him where it is. He added that unless there is some kind of obstruction or cars blocking the way, they should be able to navigate the intersection there.
- Downey said that she wasn't at the work session, so she's not getting a flavor for it tonight. Her concern is that it's not an appeal, but it's sort of an appeal. If so, we can look at things with new information that we didn't have before. She didn't see that in the letter that was sent. The main thing is that those people own the property that the City is using. So unless there is new information that you know of, that wasn't shared before, then she doesn't think it should be discussed.

- Loshbaugh and Keaton had nothing to add to the discussion.
- Puls said that so far, we've talked about it being one way; not that it's one lane. Why can't it be used both ways for travel, and have it marked as one lane wide?
- Downey said that is something we haven't talked about.
- Latta said that with all the downtown alleys, some are signed, and some aren't. Those that are signed, say one way. Those are all 15' wide. We can put up signage that says that it's a one lane road, and allow two way traffic.
- Caughey assumed tht the traffic there is only local.
- Latta said that there isn't a lot of traffic.
- Nancy Woods, 465 N. 7th, said that would help. She said that if you make it one way only, then because it's right in front of their garage, people will be using it to turn around and go back. This would help. 90% of the time, people are using their garage area and property to turn around, because of the barriers there right now. She wants to know if the City will continue to allow them (LaDuke) to have barriers on their property? What will happen with that. She knows it's their property.
- Latta said that it's not the prettiest thing, and it causes confusion. We do have surveyors going out on Tuesday next week. They will survey all of Stanley, and they'll verify where the right-of-way is. We are also talking with a contractor to get the asphalt lined up.
- Woods asked about the water line then.
- Latta said that we are working with the owner on that, and with the surveyor. We are finding out during the survey where the location of that is, and will have that easement prepared.
- Woods asked if they can leave the obstructions there forever?
- Latta said that our code enforcement officer is working with the owner on that. There comes a point where this will be in violation of our municipal code. Sure, the city is being flexible, because of the property line issue, and the road not being where it should be. At some point though, we will see that stuff go away.
- Woods commented then it doesn't matter that the road has been there since 1964.
- Latta told her it doesn't.
- LaDuke added that the barricade will go down, as soon as we know where the line is; once we are done constructing our fence. We've had people run stuff over, and people have damaged their tires. We are liable, and we don't want them to damage their tires. They've put cameras there because of that. The barricades come out when the pavement comes out. It's not meant to always be there.
- Woods said that when we hand out these permits for overheight fences, at some point, it should be the same as a building permit; and there is a certain amount of time to get it done. Would the City consider changing their free permits to something like that too?
- Latta said that he'll write it down, and talk about it in a future work session.
- Mayor Duncan said that he's living next to the pharmacy, behind EZ Stop, with a fertilizer plant across the street, not to mention the train. It's amazing what a person can learn to put up with. He pointed out where in Crow, there was a neat old dairy, that smelled to high heaven. They built a subdivision out there, and people got upset because it stunk. He hates to be the Rodney King here, but we need to be more neighborly with each other. Think of someone who is better than your self. All of you on Stanley Street should try to understand your neighbors, and try really hard to get along with them.
- Woods said that after 15 years, having to change the intersection, when nothing has happened during all that time, is a little hard to swallow.
- Mayor Duncan said that he understands that. We have a community, and there are certain ways that the City is required to operate. Everyone needs to learn how to bury the hatchet in the ground instead of in somebody's head. He asked if there was anything else from the Councilors; and since there wasn't, suggested that we move on with the next subject.

The matter of Approving the Consent List

- Puls **motioned to approve the consent list, and was seconded** by Loshbaugh. **The City Council then voted unanimously to approve the Consent List. The motion for Approving the Consent List will approve the following:**
 - **Payment of the October 2017 Bills**
 - **The Minutes of September 27, 2017**
 - **The Minutes of October 11, 2017**

The matter of a Discussion(s) with Other Agencies.

- Sergeant Greg Klein was here this evening for the Linn County Sheriff's Office, and thought Council did a great job on the last subject. He reviewed the monthly report for October. (Please see Addendum's 3 through 5, for the two Linn County Sheriff's Office Reports, and the Harrisburg Fire/Rescue District Report.) One of the calls involved several deputies, in which there was a man that was wanted by the US Marshals across the street from Harrisburg High School. Bryan Starr (Harrisburg Schools Superintendent, who was also present), and he had discussed the situation. Everything happened so quickly. The deputy that was first dealing with it, suggested that they lock down the school, but within a minute and six seconds, that person was apprehended. That information didn't get to the school. The person was charged with assault, burglary, and trespassing, plus he had outstanding warrants. Nobody knows how he got to Harrisburg.
- Downey asked if they had solved the windows being shot out yet; her son was available to help with whatever they needed help with.
- Sergeant Klein said that they were certain that it was a pellet gun that was involved. They had also recently dealt with two bomb threats. The first one was on Monday morning; he was the third deputy there. They had already cleared the kids and teachers out of the building. They went through the school several times, and one of the janitors went with them to verify that nothing was out of the ordinary. The letter did specifically say that there was a time involved, and it went past that time. They did get a hold of the Oregon Bomb Squad, who didn't start down; they felt we had done enough at that time. We had another incident, the following day. They have interviewed one person, that they suspect.
- Downey asked if it wasn't a 14-year old that first day?
- Bryan Starr, School Superintendent said that it was, and that was determined during the last five minutes of school. The 2nd day, they found a note, but only two of the words were spelled correctly in the note. We called the Sheriff, who came and looked at the note, but didn't feel it was enough of a threat. The news got out wrong that day, and the media was saying it was a similar situation; and it wasn't. We learned a lot about our communication during this; for instance, we had maintenance crews and contractors up on our roof, asking if they could go back up. Yesterday, even though we told everyone not to contact the media, they still got a hold of something. They are trying to figure out with Lieutenant Duncan, that they should have notified the parents at the end of the day. We alarm people with robocalls. It was interesting to see the different reactions we had, especially when we didn't have a true emergency.
- Sergeant Klein said that with Facebook, things are shared pretty fast. One of the protocols they follow with something major like this, is to do a de-briefing. Lieutenant Duncan will come down to talk with Bryan and his staff.

The matter of Considering Applying for a Community Development Block Grant on Behalf of the Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Partnership, and Approving Resolution No. 1175

A Public Hearing was opened at 7:34pm, in order to obtain citizen views and to respond to questions and comments about community development and housing needs, especially the needs of low-moderate income persons, as well as other needs in the community that might be assisted with a Community Development Block Grant Project

Staff Report: Latta said that the City of Harrisburg participates as part of the Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Partnership (LCRP). It offers low income housing loans throughout the county. Willamette Neighborhood Housing Services administers the program; but the partners are the fiduciary agents for that program. The City of Harrisburg is now taking our turn at doing this. Most recently, it's been Lebanon and Sweet Home that have done this, although we had our turn about ten years ago. Work has already started on this application. The grant that is applied for serves about 12 households. We would need to authorize some of the grant to be spent this year; you'll understand that process when we go through some of the other items on the agenda. Section 2 of the motion, is for us to accept the block grant award. We are doing it this way, in order to avoid having to come back to Council to accept the grant, when we've already given authorization to apply for it. This is much more efficient. We do need to adopt some policies and plans, such as fair housing, and non-discrimination, etc. We are currently working on some of those policies. He will likely bring those to Council in December.

- Brigetta Olson, Deputy Director of the Willamette Neighborhood Housing Services, said that they've been doing this for 26 years. They improve the lives, and quality of home ownership. We are in a housing crisis in the State of Oregon, and there are quite a few deteriorated homes that we have in the county. Their program improves structures, so that families have a roof over their head, and a healthy, safe home. We do have something to read through as part of the public hearing process.
- Liza Newcomb, the Housing Rehabilitation Manager for Willamette Neighborhood Housing Services, read aloud from the document that she handed out to Council. (Please see Addendum No. 6.)
- Caughey asked how citizens could find out about this program?
- Newcomb said that they put out tear sheets, with their phone number on the bottom. They also have websites, and their partners, such as the Cities, and the community services consortium, and Habitat for Humanity offices. They rely on government personnel to funnel people to them, so if you see someone who needs help, refer them to us, and we can see if they qualify for the program.
- Roger Bristol, 31166 Territorial, asked if the program applies to owner occupied homes, or to created housing?
- Newcomb said that it applies to owner occupied homes. They apply for funding from the federal government. When the home is sold, or changes ownership, and is no longer occupied by the owner, then the money is paid back. Those funds come back to the revolving fund, which gets loaned out again. The money received goes into revolving loan funds. That's one of the greatest things about the program.

Director Olson, and Newcomb, answered questions about the program, and how the revolving funds work. Director Olson said that they have a \$3.5 million portfolio right now; that benefits not only the program participants, but also the jobs that the program provides. It creates jobs, or helps people retain them. Bristol said that he's hired a kid going to Harrisburg

High School, who is homeless. He's a good kid, and is disabled. His family couldn't afford housing, so they had to split up. Mayor Duncan said that he's in construction as well; remodeling is going crazy, and everyone is booked through April and May of next year. Trying to find someone who can work, and who can pass a drug test, and have a license, is really hard. He thinks the world of the organization, and is glad that they are here.

The Public Hearing was closed at the hour of 7:50pm.

- **Caughey moved to approve Resolution No. 1175, "A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE APPLICATION AND ACCEPTANCE OF ANY AWARD FOR A COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT", and was seconded by Puls. The City Council then voted unanimously to approve Resolution No. 1175, and thereby allowing LCHRP to apply for the grant, and once approved, to accept the award of the grant.**

The matter of Approving the Adoption of a Supplemental Budget for FY 2017-2018 and approving Resolution No. 1176.

Staff Report: Finance Officer Tim Gaines was present this evening for the adoption of the supplemental budgets for both Council, and the HRA. This is the line in which the HRA borrowed the City's full faith and credit standing in order to receive a better rate. We pay the HRA from the funds borrowed, and the HRA pays us back. We weren't budgeted for this, so we needed to do a supplemental budget. That allows us to spend the funds.

- **Puls motioned to approve Resolution No. 1176, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF HARRISBURG ADOPTING A SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET FOR THE FY 2017-2018", and was seconded by both Caughey and Downey at the same time. The City Council then voted unanimously to adopt the supplemental budget in the amount of \$72,174.**

The matter of Hearing a Presentation on the Upcoming School Bond from Harrisburg School District Superintendent Bryan Starr

Harrisburg School District Superintendent Bryan Starr, 400 S. 9th St., presented some of the ideas that the school board has come up with, for the projects that they would like the proposed school bond to be applied to. They aren't to a stage in which they've decided what will be covered by bonds yet. He went over some large presentation (blueprint size) pictures of the campuses, and pointed out the areas that he was referencing. The drawings he showed, started with the Elementary School/Middle School Campus, and then the High School and District Office Campus. The main issue that they have, is the need for more classroom space, and more efficiencies with things like how quickly they can serve lunch to the kids through the day. Some of the new classroom space that they are looking at is for additions to current buildings, and others would result in new buildings, such as a new Science Building at the high school. He talked about some of the programs that they had in the high school, and the space needs that they had for them. Those are things like the culinary program, and fabrication and art classes. Another thought is to add to the auxiliary gym, so that they can add more practice, and game spaces. He also handed out a proposed project list (Please see Addendum No. 7). There are things that need to be replaced on this list, such as the heat pumps, and possible air conditioning. After what happened last Monday, they also want to address and explore a key lock system, and the installation of security cameras on the doors. The track at the high school, used to be a state of the art track. It has now deteriorated so badly that they can no longer hold meets there. The track coach had somebody out to give them a bid on what improving it would

be; they told him that they had never seen a track that was in such bad shape. The ideas that they have come from the board, as well as parents. They will narrow things down at the December board meeting. One thing they have in their favor is that their current bond will sunset in 2019. That bond comes to about \$1.09 per thousand. That helps to cover the costs of the new bond. However, they do need more than what the \$1.09 per thousand will raise. (\$6 million). The architectural firm that they are working with has said that it will cost \$15 to \$16 million for the ideas that we have now. We have a challenge to get what we need, while making it more affordable. Junction City charges \$1.67 per thousand, and Monroe charges \$1.30 per thousand. They would prefer to land somewhere in the middle of that, somewhere around \$1.50 per thousand.

Kim Downey's name is on his list of people to have on this committee; she was apparently on the last one. There will be a PAC that will be forming on getting the bond message out. They will meet on Monday, November 27th. The committee meeting will be in his office at 6:00. Anyone who would like to attend is welcome.

- Gaines said that he had read that they might apply for some grants. Did he mention that?
- Starr said that we have applied for a matching grant. There are 5 school districts above us. They are guaranteed a certain amount of money if they pass their bond. If one of those don't pass, we are next in line. There is \$4 million out there, so if we go for \$7.5 million, we could have an additional \$4 million to fall back on. The Sisters School District passed their bond, and they were next in line. There were a couple of districts that were ahead of them, but their bonds didn't pass. Sisters now has an additional \$4 million to work with; they are building a bus shelter with that. So we have that in our favor, plus the sunsetting bond.
- Downey commented that with the sunsetting bond, it's important to note that. She was talking with Caughey before the meeting, and when we were handing out signs, we met with a lot of resistance, because the fire bond had passed. They didn't want to support the City bond, because the fire district had already gone through. In her twelve years on Council, that is probably the biggest complaint that she hears. If the bond doesn't go through, then you need to go right back into it immediately. Most people want their schools to thrive, and want better water as well, but people aren't making a lot of money, and taxes keep going up.
- Starr said in response to a question from Pastor Gordon, that the types of bonds they had in mind would be determined after the May Primary Elections. It's only after that we can consider what type of bond we will offer. Their goal with the bond, is that they need to impact the students with more classroom space, and they need better security.

Council asked an assortment of questions, but most were making comments about the people that the school board had on their team, and how much they hoped that the school bond would pass. Puls asked if she could come to the meeting, and Starr told her yes. Social Media is the best place to learn about the meetings.

The matter of a Public Hearing in Regards to the Burton St. Improvement Project

A Public Hearing as required by HMC 12.25.050 was opened at this time, in order to accept testimony and eligible remonstrance's in regards to the Burton St. Improvement Project

Staff Report: Eldridge noted that at the previous meeting, the Council had decided on removing most of the curbs and gutters charges that were being assessed, in addition to the

ADA costs, in order to bring the per property charge down to a total of \$4,750 per property. The amount of the project being funded by Transportation SDC's has increased in order to absorb those charges. Resolution No. 1172 set the hearing date for the Burton St. Improvement Project to this evening, so that the property owners could come in and formally testify, and if eligible, to file remonstrances against the project. There would need to be three property owners to halt the project for a six month period. No testimony was submitted prior to this meeting, but property owners may have some to submit when you take their testimony. She noted that City Council will be able to assess the property owners at amounts other than the original \$4,750 per property if they should wish to do so. They will have that ability as they go forward, including when adopting the final ordinance assessing the project. Council can defer the decision of proceeding with the Burton St. Project for up to sixty days, they could abandon the project, or they could proceed with the Burton St. Improvement Project as is. However, if they wish to delay by the 60 day period, then they will need to hold a special council meeting. The January meeting falls on the 63rd day from this public hearing. Staff recommend that Council not abandon the project, due to the costs already incurred for engineering fees, the time spent by staff and Council in previous meetings, and the benefits to the property owners who can't proceed with the development of their properties without this street improvement project.

She further noted that the vote to proceed, if given, will direct the City Engineer to proceed with finalizing the work on the Burton St. Improvement Project, which is still at 90% of completion. The motion to proceed will allow him to complete the report, and file the form RFP. The City Council will have the chance to see those bids. If the bids are in excess of the engineer's specification, and they wish to proceed, rather than hold off to a later date, then they have the ability to hold a special meeting at that time. If the project proceeds, the project won't return to Council until the project is completed, and all costs are finalized. Property owners can return for that meeting, and still have the ability to submit written objections. She went over the three choices for motions this evening.

- Latta added that when Eldridge talks about the amounts changing, it's not a bait and switch. What she is referring to, is that we don't know exactly how much the project will be bid for. The person bidding the project could bid less than the engineer's estimate, or more. The \$4,750, could turn into \$4,600, or conversely, \$4,800 per property. When we adopt the ordinance, the owners will be sent a formal invoice, that gives them the choice to either pay the amount within 30 days, or they can establish a payment arrangement plan.
- Gaines asked if they had determined a time frame for that.
- Latta told him it was 10 years, unless they decide to pay it in full.
- Eldridge added that when the letters had been sent out to the property owners for tonights' meeting, it included an amortization schedule, that listed the \$4,750, on a ten year payment plan, at a 6.25% interest rate. The interest rate would depend upon the prime rate plus 2%, on the date that the ordinance is adopted. That would come to a \$53.33 per month payment for property owners choosing that option. She suggested that the Council allow testimony at this time, unless they had questions.
- Keaton asked if we go for the project, and we don't like the bid offers, do we need to continue?
- Latta told him if we ran the RFP, and it came back at an amount of \$350,000, then we would just say no, never mind. Council is not obligated to accept those. We can wait to a future date, or decide to not go out at all. Just because you say yes today, doesn't mean that you have to continue.
- Brad Bond, 510 N. 9th St., asked what he could do personally to get the cost of the project down to something like \$3,000?

- Mayor Duncan said that's a good question. He put in his own cement work when sidewalks were done in front of his property. His neighbor at the time, did that as well, but he didn't do a good job on it.
- Latta said that with this project, when we are hiring a contractor, they don't want it to be piecemeal. Council doesn't set what is owed until after the bid goes out. We know the cost based off of our engineer's estimate. If you remember, for Moore St., we bid the project in July, and all the bids exceeded our engineer's estimate by \$150,000. We held off until December, and the low bid that came from that was \$150,000 below the engineer's estimate. We won't see much of a variance on this one, because we had the last Moore St. bid to base this estimate on. It could be cheaper, and if it goes down, the amount will go down with it. Council can consider that before we adopt the ordinance, or they could decide on variances to the amounts.
- Bond offered to trade in his current van....
- Puls asked if we offered a discount at all? An Improvement District can be flexible, and it would be nice if we had the ability to have a program in place that could help homeowners. She said that maybe we could develop something like that between now and then, when the ordinance is adopted.
- Latta told her that we could develop a program that offered relief for property owners with hardships. We don't have that now, but it's something we could look at.
- Downey would like that, but she would want to see proof of income, number of dependents, etc.
- Keaton said that we would need to establish set criteria.
- Mayor Duncan said that he was concerned about setting a precedent.
- Latta said that's what it would be, is a precedent to deal with that kind of a situation. There is a little bit of the unknown in creating a program like that.
- Downey said that she would like to see a workshop on creating a program, or something specific in relation to improvement districts that dealt with low income residents.
- Bond said that he knows Bristol wants to build his homes, and the market is good right now. He doesn't want to impede that.
- Oral Boothe, 915 Territorial St., who was in the audience, also stated that he has no comments until he can find out what the final cost is going to be. He'd like to see what the bids come out to.
- Bristol had nothing to add to the conversation.
- Caughey then **motioned to authorize staff to direct the City Engineer to complete the Engineering Plans and Specifications for the Burton St. Improvement Project, and to determine the time and manner of advertising of the bids. He was seconded by Loshbaugh, and the City Council then voted unanimously to authorize staff to direct the City Engineer to complete the project plans, and to set up the RFP for the project.**

The matter of Considering a Recommended Bonus for Salvatore Fiducia

Staff Report: Latta said that our PW Foreman, Rick Nelson, was here to present the bonus recommendations, since the Public Works Director was at training. He said that Sal has been working hard to get certified. He recently received his certification in wastewater collection, at level 1. That allows him to be promoted to the Utility II position, starting in July of 2019. We would like to give Sal a one time bonus for that accomplishment. Nelson has given a lot of encouragement to Fiducia. It takes Council's approval to award a bonus.

- Nelson said that we are really proud of him.
- Keaton asked how hard the test was?

- Nelson said that you can sometimes cram, and study for a month to take it, and pass it, but Sal has test anxiety, so it took him a couple of times for the testing. We are tickled to death that he got this, and he's gung-ho and excited about it.
- Latta added that one of the reasons we are giving these bonuses, is because two employees did something to be recognized for, but we didn't budget for two employees. This is a good way to reward them, until they get promoted six months in the future.
- Loshbaugh **motioned to Recognize Salvatore Fiducia for his Efforts, and Award Sal a One-Time Bonus of \$1,000. He was seconded** by Downey, Puls, and Caughey, all at the same time. **The City Council then voted unanimously to award Sal Fiducia a \$1,000 bonus for his performance.**

The matter of Considering a Recommended Bonus for Phillip Peterson

Staff Report: Latta said that Phil is not a Harrisburg boy, per se, but he has put a lot of effort, pride, care, and has taken ownership of his job in landscaping, and parks. He's had good ideas, and he decided to get certified in spraying chemicals; he is now a certified pesticide applicator. We now have two employees who are certified pesticide applicators. We will promote Phil to Utility II in the next fiscal year, so like Sal, we will award him a one-time bonus. He added that this is not an easy certification to make.

- Caughey **motioned to Recognize Phillip Peterson for his Efforts, and Award Phil a One-Time Bonus of \$1,000. He was seconded** by Downey and Loshbaugh at the same time, and the **City Council voted unanimously to award the one time bonus of \$1,000 to Phillip Peterson.**
- Nelson added that these guys are great. They asked if they should be here, but he said he would attend because he wants Council to know how hard they worked. They both worked their tails off, and studied after hours on their own.
- Mayor Duncan remarked that he was also impressed with their boss; obviously with Rick staying this late for his employees, he's away from his own dinner.
- Nelson said that they are both great guys. The yards are getting better than they've ever been worked. Phil was using Arrow Leaf Park as his guinea pig so to speak, and he's now working on getting the clover out of Riverside Park. He's looked up stuff in his manual, and tried different ways of doing thing. He did a great job, so we've got a green light on his applying that methodology to Riverside Park.

The matter of Reviewing the City's 4th Quarter FY 2016-2017 Financial Report Document

Staff Report. Gaines noted that the highlights are in the staff report. We are doing fairly well, and are being conservative in not spending everything we've budgeted for. We have no issues in expenditures, as far as overspending.

- Downey noted that she liked this format that he used for the report.
- Latta added that he should say that our court fines didn't exceed 100%, which we expected.
- Gaines added that hopefully, that will improve.
- Latta said that these figures takes into account that we started court in 2016, but you can see that at 87%, we aren't far off. You should see that goal met in the next year.
- Keaton remarked that he had a question about the street fund. In miscellaneous revenue, it shows that we are budgeted at \$200, so he questioned if that was correct. There was another section that looked like it was off.
- Gaines said that he would need to research that to know for sure, but he can find that out in between meetings.

- Loshbaugh then **motioned to approve the 4th Quarter Financial Report for Fiscal Year 2016-2017. He was seconded** by Keaton, and the **City Council voted unanimously to approve the 4th Quarter Financial Report.**

The matter of Reviewing the 1st Quarter FY 2017-2018 Financial Report Document

Staff Report: Gaines remarked that things are going well in the 1st quarter of this fiscal year as well. It looks like he must have a broken formula in the report, because he's seeing a similar issue in the street fund again. He added that these are not audited figures. The audit is almost done; he has a draft on his desk right now.

- Latta noted that in the street fund, in taxes and assessments, you'll see that we are at 231.39% over budget. That's due to one homeowner paying off their sidewalk assessments.
- Puls **motioned to Approve the 1st Quarter Financial Report for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. She was seconded** by Downey, and the **City Council voted unanimously to approve the 1st Quarter FY 2017-2018 Financial Report.**

Other:

- Latta said that he's had questions about the election; Roger Nyquist had told him that there were about 20 votes (ballots) coming in from other counties, still to be counted.
- Puls said that's what she understood too.
- Eldridge noted that she had attended the Veterans Day Celebration at Lifegate Christian School on behalf of the City; and had welcomed everyone to the City in her address. She said it was a great event, although lightly attended. Half of the people in attendance were military, and we had some ranked individuals there. A state senator, James Manning, was also in attendance. She added that it would be great to get more attendance at the event in the future.
- Mayor Duncan thanked her for attending that for them.
- Eldridge continued, saying that she'd like to introduce the man in the back of the room; that's the current Chamber of Commerce President, Wynn Wendell. The Chamber has made it a priority for us to know what's going on in the cities in our Tri-County regions, so Wynn has been attending meetings. She felt badly that this meeting ended up being longer than normal, because he's been to other long meetings too...plus she should note that he used to be a City Councilor in Junction City.
- Wynn Wendell said that he had attended the Monroe City Council meeting too; it was 3.5 hours long, but they had a great excuse and he would expect that, as they have 3 former mayors on the City Council.
- Downey said that she knew that somebody had just applied for the Chamber from Harrisburg too.
- Wendell said that was great!

Old City Hall/Harrisburg Justice Center Remodel

- Latta handed out a conceptual drawing that our architect had made (Please see Addendum No. 8) This gives us a starting point to determine how you'd like to move forward. He went over the changes that had been suggested. In the Library, we are removing the back office, and relocating electrical service in the middle of the room to the outside instead. By relocating an office and storage, we can add a bathroom. If you remember, that was one of the complaints that they had made; about the route to the bathroom. This also gives the Library better visibility from the street. There is a door there now, but we will likely center that, and make the opening more prominent.

- Keaton asked about the removal of the walls there. He thought we were limited to stay within 5% of the wall square footage for openings.
- Latta told him that was only if the wall is structural. We put those walls in, and we can remove them. To the right of the area, on the area on the south side of the kitchen, we would keep those walls. We will expand the kitchen, which used to be right there. His thought is that the space that was city hall, and the justice center offices, could be the senior center instead. That allows them to utilize the kitchen area, plus they can use the assembly room when it's not in use by the city or court. We would remove the judge's bench, and hopefully can remove the walls from the substation area; the architect wasn't certain if those were structural or not.
- Downey asked if our Judge didn't want the bench that is there now?
- Latta told her no, he doesn't. He doesn't want to be up there. We would add onto the center, and would have a restroom and office that was for court purposes only. Functionally, we would like a permanent council dais up here, in the front of the room, and on court days, the Judge would set on the dais. To the side would be the jury, and we would have a jury room for them. The Judge really liked this concept, and said from a judicial standpoint, it would work out well. We would have chairs in the main part of the assembly room, which could be opened for use during community events. This room could also be used as an operations center during an emergency.
- Keaton said he wasn't sure about that, because he didn't think the building was seismically updated.
- Latta agreed, but said that there are grants out there. We might be able to upgrade the building itself, if we use it as an Emergency Operations Center. (EOC). That would likely push the timing out, but if you are interested in that, we could consider it.
- Puls asked if it wouldn't be a shelter then?
- Latta said that with the new fire station, perhaps that would make a good EOC, and then we could leave this part of the building for use as a shelter.
- Mayor Duncan thought that was all encompassed in the new fire station.
- Latta said that we are essentially next door to each other with this center. If you like the plan he has, then great, but if you'd rather see changes to this, that's fine too. He had initially envisioned a larger library here, but unfortunately, where we wanted to make changes, we couldn't cut into the wall due to the limitation of openings not being more than 5% of the wall. If you have a non-reinforced wall, then you can't have your openings in the wall exceeding 5% of the wall square footage. There are already two doors here.
- Puls noted that you do have the front office room that you'd be giving to the Library.
- Latta said that he should add that he'd be giving the Library a storage room in the hallway to supplement their loss of storage in the back room.
- Puls said that Cheryl would be given a lot more room, and that it would be nicer, and more open. Anything would actually be better than what we have.
- Latta said that we aren't taking away space; and we are giving them a bathroom, which they want. She doesn't need to have an office, because most things are done at the circulation desk. Because the Harrisburg Library Guild is being optimistic about their fundraising, they might be able to get into a new building faster, but to be pessimistic, we are least giving more space to the Library than what it has now. We balance the space against the seniors; it gives them slightly more space than what they have.
- Puls asked if he had plans for that building?
- Latta said that since the H.A.R.T. Community Center is losing their pre-school space, that they could use the former senior center room instead for that.



- Loshbaugh wasn't happy about those modular units still being used. Also, the seniors are losing space?
- Latta said no; they have more room, because they will be able to share the assembly room space, and share the kitchen. They can use those areas when they hold their events. It gives them more space in the aggregate, and the kitchen will also be nicer.
- Keaton said that their parking would be farther away.
- Latta said yeah, it would be a little farther away.
- Eldridge added that they need to include on-street parking, rather than just the parking lot.
- Loshbaugh asked where the deputy substation would be moved to?
- Latta told him it would be in this room we are in right now. We'll divide it in half again, and will make a conference space here, and then add a couple of desks to the other side. We can also get an intoxilyzer from the state police when we do this. Right now, people pulled over in town, must go to Albany to be tested; giving them time to sober up. Having it here will be better for us.
- Downey asked about having an area for interrogations?
- Latta said that the space for their office would be dedicated. People coming to the substation would use the front entrance.
- Downey asked if they wouldn't come in the door that's here now?
- Latta told her that was correct, they would come to the lobby. It would work well for them, and its still bigger than what they have in some communities.
- Downey said that they wouldn't need SALT then. (City Recorders Note: Seniors and Law Together – SALT provides volunteers for the substation on a current basis.)
- Latta told her no, they wouldn't. In any case, he asked everyone to process this, see what you think, and we'll put it on the agenda in December, to have the public attend.
- Keaton said that would be on December 13th, right?
- Latta said yes. We'll invite public comments, and will invite the senior center, and the Library Guild, etc.
- Keaton didn't imagine that we would have lots of people there.
- Latta said that while no public comment is required, it is a public building.
- Puls said that the senior center, and the Harrisburg Library Guild (HLG) would definitely need to be included.
- Latta said that we will invite HLG, the Senior Center, and Cheryl. The architect doesn't get involved much after this. We can use a structural engineer.
- Downey liked the idea of having buzzers, like what the City of Eugene currently uses for their Council.
- Latta said that we will have lots of finishing touches to think about. He didn't think that Council wanted to get involved to the point of picking out cabinets, and other things like that. If they do, we can take that step. If you really want to get involved, we can form a committee.
- Loshbaugh said that he was still not happy about the existing senior center building and H.A.R.T. buildings. We thought that they would fall apart when they got moved here.
- Latta noted that his recommendation is that the HART Center preschool could go there instead of the senior center. But if you'd rather have the buildings removed entirely, we could do that as well.
- Downey said that the Library would have the whole side of the current building. It's funny that the entire space used to have the senior center in the back of the building, with the Library in that little office space.


- Puls said that she was looking forward to tomorrow evening, when we honor Caughey for all his hard work on the water bond. He had a positive outlook from the beginning.

- Caughey said that he does have all the signs, which he would return to the City. If the City wants to do something again in the future, we can use them.

Mr. Council President,

We took two of our engines down to Stanley Ln. this morning to do some measurements. It will be very tight if the new fence will be placed where the homeowner has the string placed in the street. From the string to the fence on the opposite side of the road is 171 inches and our engine with the doors open is 152 inches wide. We do have to run up on a portion of the curb now when we enter from N. 7th. I do have a concern about the actual roadway that is Stanley Ln. As the engine was moving from place to place for the pictures and the measurements, I noticed the asphalt sinking down a couple inches each time the engines tires rolled over an area that is between the two properties at the East end of Stanley. I would be happy to show any of the council or the public works manager what I am talking about.

After reviewing this and taking measurements we will be able to get our fire engines in and out of Stanley Ln. in an emergency provided that there are no obstructions in the roadway.

The City of Harrisburg is eligible to apply for a 2017 Community Development Block Grant from the Oregon Business Development Department. Community Development Block Grant funds come from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The grants can be used for public facilities and housing improvements, primarily for persons with low and moderate incomes.

Approximately \$12 million will be awarded to Oregon non-metropolitan cities and counties in 2017. The maximum grant that a city or county can receive is \$2,500,000.

The City of Harrisburg is preparing an application for a 2017 Community Development Block Grant from the Oregon Business Development Department for the Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Partnership Program in rural Linn County which includes the incorporated cities of Lebanon, Brownsville, Halsey, Harrisburg, Scio, Sodaville, Sweet Home, Tangent, Waterloo and all unincorporated areas of Linn County. It is estimated that the proposed project will benefit at least 40 persons, of whom 100% will be low or moderate income.

The purpose of this hearing is for the Harrisburg City Council to obtain citizen views and to respond to questions and comments about: community development and housing needs, especially the needs of low- and moderate-income persons, as well as other needs in the community that might be assisted with a Community Development Block Grant project; and the proposed project.

More information about Oregon Community Development Block Grants, and the proposed project are available for public review at City of Harrisburg Finance Office during regular office hours.

Permanent involuntary displacement of persons or businesses is not anticipated as a result from the proposed project. If displacement becomes necessary, alternatives will be examined to minimize the displacement and provide required/reasonable benefits to those displaced. Any low- and moderate-income housing which is demolished or converted to another use will be replaced.

Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Partnership Program

The Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Partnership Program provides deferred, 0% interest rehabilitation loans to qualified low-moderate income homeowners in targeted areas of Linn County. Maximum loan amount is \$35,000. Typical repairs include upgrades of housing systems (electrical, plumbing, waterproofing, and heating); corrections to structures to maintain health, life and safety standards, including water and septic; and general improvements to the exterior and interior of homes.

The program is provided in partnership with local governments in rural Linn County. The \$400,000 grant will provide loan funds to at least 12 households and some administration and management fees to operate the program. WNHS has operated this program since January 2007.

The Linn County Housing Rehabilitation Program is a much-needed program for low- moderate income homeowners in Linn County. Economic conditions make it difficult for homeowners to make necessary repairs to their home, ultimately leading to deteriorating quality, lower home values, and increased health and safety concerns. When household budgets are strained, families will put off home rehabilitation, in order to pay for other essentials. Households have to make hard decisions when deciding whether to repair their homes or pay monthly bills.

The Local Housing Goals of the Rehabilitation Loan Program, as documented in the LINN COUNTY HOUSING REHABILITATION PARTNERSHIP Policies and Procedures, are to:

1. Alleviate health and safety problems and correct structural deficiencies in target area homes;
2. Conserve and improve existing low income housing stock;
3. Enable low - moderate income homeowners to remain in their homes.


