Are you Ready for an Emergency?

As you prepare your house for guests, and decorate away, please remember to work safe. December is a month that is always high in accidents. Not only is it cold, and icy outside, but lots of people light candles, and spend more time in the kitchen cooking and baking. Be pro-active this year, and prepare for whatever comes your way!

Do you have an Emergency Supply Kit or a Go Bag? Now is the time to think about being prepared, before an emergency hits. Drop by City Hall to pick up a free mini-booklet that is available in our lobby. Those include how to make an emergency supply kit, ways to protect your property, how to be water wise, reclaim water, and general emergency preparedness. https://www.ready.gov/ is a terrific website that has a lot of information for citizens to review in order to prepare yourself for whatever comes your way.

Emergencies are truly a fact of life, and having an emergency supply kit at home and in your vehicle can help. Keep at least 3 days' worth of supplies for each family member. Include at least 1 gallon of water per person per day, canned meat, fish, fruit, vegetables and juice, peanut butter, crackers, cereal and granola bars, baby food or formula if needed, and food and extra water for any pets you have. Keep your supplies safe, in airtight plastic bags or containers. Rotate your emergency stock with regular household items, so supplies can be kept fresh. Don't forget medications for your self or family members.

Include a general emergency medical kit, a manual can opener, a flashlight and extra batteries, whistles and a battery-powered or hand crank radio plus a NOAA weather radio, plastic garbage bags with ties, matches in a waterproof container, a pail with cover, chlorine bleach, spare keys, fire extinguisher, plastic sheeting and duct tape, dust and protective masks.

In a true emergency, watch the City's webpage and social media for instructions, or tune in with your battery powered radio.
